Year 2 Teacher Guide: Government House, Darwin

The House on the Hill

Learning Area: History Stage of Schooling: Year 2

Topic: Our past and present connections to people and places

Knowledge and Understanding:

Students will investigate the history of a chosen person, building, site or landmark in the local community using sources (for example, books, newspapers, oral histories, audiovisual material, digital sources, letters, photographs) and relating a story which these reveal about the past

Achievement Standard:

By the end of Year 2, students describe a person, site and/or event of significance in the local community. They identify how and why the lives of people have changed over time while others have remained the same. Students sequence events in order, using a range of terms related to time. They pose questions about the past and use sources provided to answer these questions and to identify a point of view. They compare objects from the past and present. Students develop a narrative about the past using a range of texts.

Inquiry Questions:

- What aspects of the past can you see today? What do they tell us?
- What remains of the past are important to the local community? Why?

Lesson: The House on the Hill

Learning Intention:

Students will use the tour of Government House to investigate what life was like in early Darwin.

Success Criteria:

Students will -	
Question:	What aspects of Government House tell us about the past? What do they tell us about our local community?
Research:	Government House to investigate the building, its construction and how it is maintained.
Analyse:	By comparing and contrasting the story with Government House today to determine the differences.
Evaluate:	To decide upon the advantages and disadvantages of the two settings.
Communicate:	By creating and sharing ideas about how the building could be improved. Researching and sharing information about life at the time.


Government House Time Capsule
